

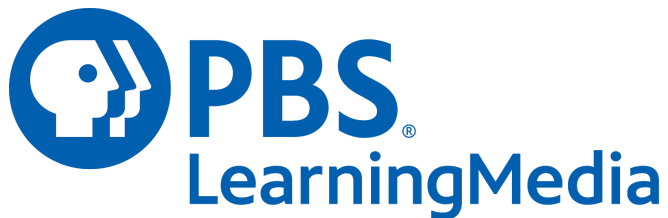
**PBS LearningMedia Resources: Race, Racism, Protests, Civil Rights, Current Events, and more.**
